ALL-STATE BAND BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The members of the All-State Band were selected by auditioning at one of the eight audition centers throughout the State. The four audition judges fly around the State to each site over a period of six days and listen to students. From that number the 171 students that are in this year's band were selected. The members of the Band represent 51 South Dakota schools. There are 74 seniors, 52 juniors, 37 sophomores and 8 freshmen in the band.

GUEST CONDUCTOR



Mallory B. Thompson
University of South Florida

Mallory Thompson is Director of Band and Associate Professor of Conducting at the University of South Florida. As Director of Bands, Professor Thompson conducts the Wind Ensemble, Chamber Winds, and Symphony Band, teaches courses in conducting and repertoire, and directs the Masters program in Wind Conducting. Previous to this appointment, Dr. Thompson was Visiting Professor of Conducting at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music where she conducted the Wind Ensemble and Chamber Winds, and taught courses in advanced conducting.

Ms. Thompson also served for three years as Director of Bands at Bucknell University, where she conducted the Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, and Opera Workshop. She taught a variety of courses for both music majors and non-majors including conducting, survey of symphonic literature, music appreciation, and an interdisciplinary humanities course. Dr. Thompson began her teaching career at Alma College in Michigan as Director of Instrumental Music, conducting the College-Community Symphony Orchestra, Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble, and Marching Band.

Ms. Thompson received the Bachelor's degree in Music Education and Master of Music degree in Conducting from Northwestern University. While a student at Northwestern, she studied conducting with John Paynter and trumpet with Vincent Cichowicz. She received her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting from the Eastman School of Music, where she was assistant conductor of the Eastman Wind Ensemble and studied with Donald Hunsberger. While pursuing her doctoral degree, she was also conductor of the University of Rochester Wind Ensemble and the Erie County Music Educators Wind Ensemble.

Dr. Thompson maintains an active schedule as guest conductor and clinician with recent engagements in Illinois, Iowa, New York, New Jersey, Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio, New Hampshire, Utah, Rhode Island, Minnesota, Louisiana, Nebraska, Texas, Florida, Washington and Wisconsin. She has held residencies or served as guest lecturer at St. Olaf College, University of Wisconsin, the University of Minnesota, Ithaca College, and was a member of the summer conducting faculty at Northwestern University for three years. In addition, she has been a conductor or clinician at regional and national conventions of the College Band Directors National Association and the Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Clinic. Ms. Thompson holds memberships in many associations including Pi Kappa Lambda, Music Educators National Conference, College Band Directors National Association, World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, and Florida Bandmasters Association.

During this evening's concert various special presentations will be made. Included in these presentations will be the induction of two individuals into the SDBA "Hall of Fame", the presentation of a SDHSAA "Distinguished Service Award" and the presentation of the "NFIMA Outstanding Music Educator Award".

SOUTH DAKOTA BANDMASTERS HALL OF FAME

E. ORVILLE EVENSON, Aberdeen

Mr. Evenson received his state teaching certificate from Augustana College in 1939. He again attended Augustana and graduated, in 1947, with a Bachelor of Arts degree and then traveled to the University of Colorado where he earned a B.M. degree in 1953 and a M.M.E. degree in 1954.

He began his teaching career in 1939 at Butler, SD. After spending some time in the armed services, in 1947 he began teaching again, this time in Clark, SD. In 1952 he moved to Boulder, CO and taught in a private school. In 1954 he moved again, this time to teach in the North Platte, NE schools.

In 1955 he made his final career move to Aberdeen, SD and taught band for 28 years in the Aberdeen Public Schools.

Some of the awards that he has received are: the Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Bandmaster Award, the SDMEA Distinguished Service Award, and the Phi Beta Mu Distinguished Service Award.

Mr. Evenson was the business manager of the South Dakota Musician magazine for ten years, the site Chairman of the SD All-State Band (four times), All-State Band Audition Chairman, Region IV Music Secretary/Contest Manager for 30 years, instructor at the Black Hills Music Camp, and President of SD Bandmasters Association.

He was an active member of SDBA, SDEA/NEA and was president of the Kiwanas Club. He is currently active in the Aberdeen Area Retired Teachers Association.

Mr. Evenson has served as a contest adjudicator in South Dakota and North Dakota.

This summer Orville will be celebrating his 25th year as conductor of the Aberdeen Municipal Band.

DR. LELAND A. LILLEHAUG, Sioux Falls

Dr. Lillehaug's education includes: B.A. magna cum laude, Augustana College 1951; Fulbright Scholar to the Academy of Music, Vienna, Austria 1951-52; M.M. Eastman School of Music 1953; and Ph.D. Eastman School of Music 1962.

Dr. Lillehaug was a member of the 71st Army Band, Ft. Clayton in the Panama Canal Zone from 1946-48. He was the Director of Instrumental Music at Waverly Public Schools, Waverly, IA 1953-56.

He was a member of the music faculty at Augustana College from 1956-91 and served as the Music Department Chair, 1973-75 and 1986-90. While director of bands, 1956-78 and 1986-89, he led the band on many tours throughout the United States and produced eleven recorded albums.

Dr. Lillehaug founded and conducted the Sioux Falls Park and Recreation Youth Band, 1971-77.

As Department Head of the Sioux Falls Municipal Band, 1963-86, he conducted 40 concerts annually totaling more than 900 concerts.

Dr. Lillehaug conducted 19 musicals for Sioux Valley Hospital Auxiliary and Augustana College.

He has been the guest conductor of many bands, including the US Marine Band and the US Army Band.

As a woodwind musician he has performed with major ice shows, the Canadian National Ballet, Ringling Brothers Circus, Barnum and Bailey Circus, Myron Floren and Various symphony orchestras.

Dr. Lillehaug has been President of the National Association of Concert Bands, the band division Chairman of the National Federation of Music Clubs, Danforth Associate, a member of the South Dakota Arts Council, and has been listed in Who's Who in American Education. He was also chosen as one of the "Ten Outstanding Music Educators for 1986-87" by School Musician magazine.

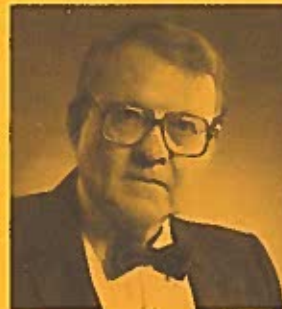
He was elected to the American Bandmasters Association in 1963. Other professional organizations include: Association of Concert Bands, SDBA, and Windjammers.

Dr. Lillehaug has been an adjudicator for South Dakota All-State Band, the business manager of the South Dakota Musician magazine, a clinician, a guest conductor of many festivals, and an adjudicator for many music contests.

He is the founder of the Augustana College Concert Band Festival, serving students and band directors from four states.

Dr. Lillehaug has co-authored the book *The History of the Sioux Falls Municipal Band, 1919-1994*. He has done research for the U.S. Office of Education, has published sacred music for voices and instruments and has written articles in numerous music journals.

SDHSAA DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD



JACK KNOWLES, Rapid City

Jack Knowles retired in 1992 after forty-six years of teaching public school instrumental music, the last twenty-three years of which he was Director of Bands at Central High School in Rapid City.

Mr. Knowles is a past president and served as a board member of the South Dakota Bandmasters Association. For fifteen years, he acted as area chairman for the South Dakota All-State Band Auditions, and was twice a local chairman when the South Dakota All-State Band performed in Rapid City.

He is a recipient of the South Dakota Music Educators Association Gold Staff and Distinguished Service Awards, as well as the Phi Beta Mu Bandmaster

of the Year Award and Distinguished Service Awards.

At the present time, Mr. Knowles conducts the Black Hills Symphony Orchestra (his 22nd season as director), is co-director of the Rapid City Municipal Band (his 24th season), and is a part-time teacher of Band and Music Appreciation at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology in Rapid City.

NATIONAL FEDERATION INTERSCHOLASTIC MUSIC ASSOCIATION OUTSTANDING MUSIC EDUCATOR AWARD

DOUGLAS CARPENTER, Watertown

Before his retirement in 1987, Douglas Carpenter taught band for 35 years at Geddes, Tripp and Watertown. During that time he also taught vocal music, history, government and music orientation. He served as a guidance counselor at Tripp and was Chairman of the Fine Arts Department in Watertown. Carpenter served also as a staff member for summer music camps at USD and SDSU.

Even though retired from active teaching, he has remained a driving force in music education. He is called upon frequently to serve as an adjudicator at music contests. As the secretary-treasurer of the South Dakota Bandmasters from 1969 until 1993, he has been a vital key in the operation of the All-State Band.

Mr. Carpenter has received numerous awards including: Kappa Kappa Psi Outstanding High School Band Director for South Dakota, 1958; South Dakota Teacher of the Year, 1975; Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Band Director Award, 1976; National Band Association Citation of Excellence, 1980; Phi Beta Mu Distinguished Service Award, 1987; Region III South Dakota Music Contest Service Award, 1987; Watertown Athletic Department Service Award, 1987; South Dakota Music Educators Distinguished Service Award, 1988; South Dakota High School Activities Association Distinguished Service Award, 1988 and election to the South Dakota Bandmasters Association Hall of Fame (charter member), 1992.

During his tenure as a band director and secretary-treasurer of the Bandmasters, Doug Carpenter has touched the lives of thousands of young musicians in the upper Midwest region. He summed up his own experiences best by saying, "I have devoted my entire adult life to quality education, and I must say, I have enjoyed every minute of it."
